

The beginning

On 14th November 1991 sixteen classic car enthusiasts gathered at the Hare and Hounds pub at Mill Brow, just up the hill from Marple Bridge and formed the Hare & Hounds Classic Car Club.

A decision was made by those present that future meetings would take place on the first Thursday of each month. Fred Gall, landlord of the Hare & Hounds pub, took on the role of chairperson and the secretary role was taken by Chris Parr. The roles weren't officially elected, but it was agreed they would take responsibility of the club until such time an election was deemed appropriate.

Each person present submitted their name, address and telephone number in order that a register of members could be kept.

Fred Gall was elected to provide a notice board to be used for club news and arrange headed notepaper for the club. The possibility of producing a monthly news sheet was discussed.

The basis for the club were set out at the very beginning:

- 1. To become a member, one is not required to own such a device, but merely to have a desire to become involved.
- 2. Basically, we all want to have a bit of fun and the committee hope to organise different events through the year.
- 3. Annual subscription set at £5.
- 4. Membership cards and a regular newsletter to be provided.

By the second meeting numbers had swelled to thirty, purely by word of mouth. A treasurer and publicity secretary were elected and it was decided that committee meetings would take place on another night so that club meetings could remain informal. The December meeting was concluded with an instructional talk given by Mr I Hammer on the 'UNIVALVE Anti-theft device'.

Chris Parr produced the club's first newsletter in January 1992.

The first club event 'Show-off Day' took place in February and thirteen cars (and a bit) were on display. The 'bit' was an assortment of parts for Mick Lee's yet to be assembled Austin Seven Special. He had bought the car in a box, three years previously!

Attendance at the meetings continued to swell and the 'noggin' meeting in March declared that the club was really 'up and rolling!'.

In April the first one of many Treasure Hunts took place, the winners received a trophy and four bottles of wine, whilst the booby prize was a model Bentley kit!

During the year the newsletter began to profile club members and their cars. A list was produced and members boasted an impressive and varied array of classics from Ron Catterick's Rolls-Royce 20/25, Miles Johnson's Jaguar XK 140 DHC, David Brown's Ford V8 Pilot, Richard Gleave's Aston Martin DBS V8, Winston Greenwood's Austin 12 Tourer and Peter Higson's Lotus Seven Series 2 to name but a few.

The year ended with the AGM and on the 30th December a visit to Clive Williams's factory to view a fantastic collection of wheeled transport.

The rules shouldn't be too strict, the requirement being that one only needed to have the interest. There were 8 of us that tight, so we formed the Committee and off we set. We followed this up, treading very carefully, with meetings in Docember and January


In February, we held our first event which was a "Show-Off day", held in the Pub car park, we were pleased to welcome 13 1/2 vehicles - the 1/2 being odd parts of Mick Lec's Austin 7 special, undergoing restoration. (See this months' profile') The club was beginning to grow, and we were discovering just how many "classics" there are in our area. Now, after 12 months, we've had a few ups and downs, the ups being the good social events we've had and the prizes that have been won around the shows, the downs coming with disappointing support sometimes, and the disastrous purchase of a s/h Photo-copier which cost the club dear, before it died (that problem not yet solved).

Publication of the Newsletters has been the biggest hurdle, especially as we wanted to maintain low subscription charges. Apart from the Desk Top Publishing, which has always been carried out by Sleve Goddard, with our grateful thanks, the reproduction (Photo-copying) has been shared around the members, namely, Mite Davies, Tony Welsby, Christopher Labrey, John Marsh, Paul Greenough and, a friend of the club, Mr Norman Gilsson. Thanks chapes, we couldn't have done it without your help.

The club continues to go from strength to strength. We have a membership well into the 90%, and in the coming year, hope to put on our own Classic Car Show and perhaps invite other clubs to join in. We are currently trying to create a Sub-committee to organise this, and still need volunteers Stuart.

The club went into a new year with a new and enlarged committee, with most of the old faces remaining.

It is now that we start to see the familiar logo on the front of correspondence, designed by Dottie Hill. For some time, it had been suggested that the club should have their own vehicle badge, so it was in this year that it became a reality. Cast in brass, finished in blue and stamped with each individual's membership number it was the 'must have' of the car club members and described as magnificent.



February started the year with the H & H second 'Show-off Day' gathering of classics at the station restaurant at Broadbottom.

Club's members had an array of makes and models including John Marsland's 1928 Model 'A' Roadster Ford with an open top and Dicky seat imported from Florida.

Another successful renovation was by member Ernie Oliver who was the proud owner of an MGA Coupe Mk 2 which started life in 1961.

Keith Stafford struck lucky when he bought a 1953 MG TD. The previous owner had spent fourteen years restoring it to better than original condition. Once it was done, he lost interest in it, so Keith was able to snap it up.

Dave Brown was the proud owner of a shiny, black beautiful Ford V8 Pilot. The '49 model was once owned by the Cadbury family and had a 3.6 litre side valve engine.

Steve Goddard owned an XK150 Coupe which was a bit of a dog when he got it! He original estimation of 6 weeks to overhall the vehicle turned into a two year marathon!

The 1993 season kicked off with a club stand at Oulton Park Classic Car Show and a 110% attendance. Could this have been because of the acquisition of a club tent and Barbeque? Wrists were smacked though, with everyone having such a great time there was no one to man the club stand!

Eight vehicles from the club took part in the Norwich Union Run in May. A tender vehicle tagged along with the wine, sandwiches and an odd spanner. All participants followed a route set out in details with checkpoints along the way. One being MIRA (Motor Industry Research Association). The journeys were not without their hiccups, including an oil leak, engine overheating, the parting of an exhaust, wobbling wheel and a loss of electrics. However, a great day was had by all.

The Norwich Union

The RAC Classic was started in 1986 with the intention of encouraging owners of classic cars to use their cars for pleasure.

It was originally sponsored by the Norwich Union insurance company and over the succeeding years became universally known by all participants, the classic car press and public alike as 'The Norwich Union'.

The first run was planned for Whit Sunday 1986 and with the added attraction of a finish at Silverstone - home of the British F1 Grand Prix it attracted over 400 entrants. Over the years the event grew in popularity, the number of starts grew and the event grew in length with options of 2 and 3 days runs from some starts. The run continued through the rest of the 1980s and 1990s until 2000.

The summer season continued with club stands at classic car shows, rallies and other local events and even an organised car boot sale to boost club funds.

'Club Show Day' was organised in September with the aim of bringing all members vehicles together on display for the public in the field behind the Lane Ends pub. There was an excellent turnout and all vehicles on display took home with them a Hare & Hounds Club Plaque to remember their day.

A bit of excitement came the club's way in the form of a 1970s Bedford ambulance which had been converted into a caravanette. The idea was that it could be used as the club's hospitality vehicle at shows. It needed some work to make it road worthy, but with plenty of expertise within the club that was not thought to be a problem. Collecting the ambulance from Bury was quite an adventure and involved half a dozen members, a Range Rover and a trailer. The ride home on the motorway was very hairy with the trailer swaying violently and threatening to turn over. The towing speed had to be reduced to 28mph, making it a long journey home!




1970s Bedford ambulance

As Insurance Companies began to expand their facilities to cover 'classics' they needed an official valuation agreed at club level, so the club for a small fee to help club funds were then able provide their members with valuations.

A treat for club members was a talk by Ian Rimmer on Rolls-Royce. Ian had always been interested in classic cars. He joined Rolls-Royce Motor Cars in 1967 and the Enthusiasts club in 1968.

In 1986 he wrote a book on the experimental cars that had come out of Crewe, with one of them a 1955 Silver Wraith undergoing restoration in his garage. For anyone who still has a copy of his book, keep it safe, as it is worth around £120 now!




Club outings started to venture a bit further afield with a coach trip organised to the Heritage Motor Museum at Gaydon. Meetings were busy with quizzes, crosswords, talks and in August a run out to the Lady Bower Inn at Bamford, particularly remembered as an admiring cyclist fell off his bike whilst admiring a member's E-type Jag!

Show time again started with the usual stand at Oulton Park, followed by the Norwich Union Run. Entrants in 1994 were treated to a reception at Lyme Hall the evening before, which was given by the National Trust who had recently taken over the property from Stockport MBC. Stops on this run included the Jaguar Factory at Coventry.

A re-visit was made to the Lancashire and Cheshire Car Show in Timperley with club members picking up several of the prizes!

The 2rd club show took place at the Lane Ends pub in Marple Bridge with live music and proved to be a popular family event.



The final event of the year was The New Brighton Classic with over 200 cars on display. For members of the club the day was concluded with a scenic run back to the Hare and Hounds pub.

At the September meeting members were asked to sign a petition regarding the introduction of a possession tax on classic vehicles to be sent to the Minister of Transport at Westminster.

TAX CRACKDOWN COULD HIT CLASSIC OWNERS (Oct 1992)

Plans to crack down on car tax dodgers could be a severe blow to classic car owners unless enthusiast's win concessions from the government. Roads Minister Robert Key wants road tax paid on all cars, whether or not they are on the main road or not. At present tax only has to be paid on cars that are being used on the road. If his plans come into effect without any concessions for classic cars, it would mean that someone doing a long-term restoration would still have to pay tax every year, even if the car was reduced to a box of bits!


The year finished with a display of club member's cars in Marple Bridge, organised by Marple Bridge Traders with one lucky member winning a bottle of Scotch! The event was to try and help the local shopkeepers recapture some of their lost business after the collapse of the wall into river.

The year began with the club's AGM and the election of a new and very enthusiastic committee. Club subs increased to £10 to help off-set the magazine printing, the posting costs and to also help with the restoring of the ambulance and improve the stand at shows.

In April Donald Campbell's attempts at capturing the World water speed record came under discussion when the club welcomed Donald Wooley, a former member of the Campbell team. His interesting talk was accompanied with lots of slides and photos. Members heard all about his meeting with Marlena Dietrich. At the end of his talk, he distributed photographs signed by Donald Campbell.

Following the visit to the Manchester College of Arts & Technology Restoration Show in 1994, the club had a great evening at the restoration workshops and were shown what the course covers. Members were amazed by the attention to detail of the students in the paint workshop. Some even enrolling on courses.

A plea was sent out for any cartoonists in the club. Cartoons had been added to the newsletter from beginning and editor Chris was finding it difficult to find copyright free images. His prayers were answered by member Glyn Vandester.



Now with over one hundred members, events continued throughout the year, including a Sunday afternoon mystery tour into Derbyshire and an invitation to the very popular Young Farmer's Show at Romiley. Two memorable trips were made to the TVR factory in Blackpool and the Morgan factory in Malvern.

In August after much deliberation and thought, the club decided not to restore the ambulance due to the cost of restoration and the subsequent running costs which would have been prohibitive and a permanent drain on club funds.

The two highlights of the year were the 3rd club show held at the George Hotel in Compstall and the first Christmas Dinner Dance held at the Alma Lodge Hotel.



1996 started with an invitation from the High Peak MG Owners Club to join them in a New Year's Day Run around Derbyshire.

In April the club organised a 'Tulip' run (Peaks & Dales) in aid of 'Glengarth', a local charity supporting the mentally handicapped. There was an entry fee of £15, which included refreshments at the start point, full tulip route, rally plate, finishing plaque and a navigators scroll. Sponsorship forms were available for any entrant who wanted to help raise funds. The fun started from the memorial car park in Marple and finished at the Pavilion Gardens in Buxton.

The run was 120 miles and entry wasn't just restricted to club members, anyone with a classic car (registered before 31st December 1980) was welcome. On arrival at Buxton the brass band was playing. The chairman of Derbyshire County Council Mr Harry Lowe presented finishing plaques and navigators' certificates to entrants.



The main prize of the day was the car Harry would most like to take home and went to Chester Maddox with his immaculate MG TC.

Forty-six cars took part in the Peaks & Dales Charity Run and raised £1000 for Glengarth.

Many other events took place during the year including a trip to Mouldsworth Motor Museum and the American Car collection.

In September the 4th Club Show took place at the George Hotel in Compstall. For the first time in the club's history a cup was awarded, given by Pat & Fred Gall, committee members and landlords of the Hare & Hounds Pub. It was to the owner of the car, picked by an independent judge, and won by Ernie Oliver with a lovely Iris Blue MGA.

Who remembers 'Play your cards right' with Bruce Forsyth? Advertised as a mystery night ahead, this turned out to be theme of the October Club night organised and hosted by Fred Gall and ably assisted by Chairman Phil Maddocks. A memorable evening and noted as a 'real club get together'.

A special night for the ladies was organised in October which included a fashion show at the Women's Institute in Marple Bridge.

Mystery was obviously the theme for the Autumn as Keith Stafford organised a mystery run for members on unfamiliar roads heading towards Chatsworth.

The year was completed with another dinner dance at the Alma Lodge Hotel, a great night enjoyed by all!

Another busy year of planned events for club members.

The April meeting was advertised as being an explosive evening with a light-hearted talk from Clive Williams on one of his hobbies - collecting antique firearms!

This was the year when the format of the A4 newsletter and news bulletin was to change into the A5 booklet we know today. Ably assisted by Iain Robertson, Chris Parr worked on the magazine to expand its content and provide members with technical articles. The new format was to offer 'a wants' and 'for sale' page.



It seems that when the club first started, Hare & Hounds landlord and club member Fred Gall would bring round a complimentary plate of sandwiches. After moving to the new venue, at the end of the first meeting it was a case of 'where are the sandwiches?'. The lovely H & H ladies came to the rescue and prepared a rota to ensure the tradition was saved.

First show of the year at Oulton Park in May was a mixed day of weather, rain, snow, hail and just a bit of sunshine. Plenty of runs and club events followed with the club attending more events than ever before with new stands at Chatsworth Festival of Transport and Matlock Motor Leisure & Family Fun Extravaganza.

Members let their hair down at a charity evening organised by the club with a live country band and line dancing which raised £160 for Glengarth. By the end of the year the club had the pleasure of presenting a cheque to the charity for £1200.

The 2nd Peaks & Dales Charity Run got off to a good start with a cup of tea and bacon butties for participants. The run went to through Calver to Bakewell and towards Buxton via the beautiful scenery in the Manifold Valley.

Prizes were again awarded by Mr Harry Lowe and the car he chose that he would like to take home was Graham Cox's Daimler Dart.



The 5th Club Show was held at Etherow Country Park in Compstall and a great success. The member's shield was a new prize this year and members who attended were asked to vote for their favourite car. The winner was Chester Maddox with his popular MG TC.

The club supported local businesses in Romiley with a display of some members classics, the police provided an escort with flashing lights for the parade through Romiley.

The year finished with a dinner dance at the Alma Lodge Hotel and the announcement of a motorcycle section to be added to the club.

At the beginning of the year a proposal was put forward for the consideration of a small modification made to club's name from the Hare & Hounds Classic Car Club to the Hare & Hounds Classic Vehicle Club due the expansion of the club and types of vehicles the new members had brought with them: motorhomes, commercial vehicles & motor cycles.

A new monthly draw was to take place with a member's number drawn out of a hat for a monthly cash prize. The prize started at £5 and increased up to a maximum of £60 if not won the following month/s.

There were the usual events and club members attended various local shows round and about.

Dave Rawson organised a trip to Ireland in June where eighteen club members took part in an organised rally event by the Kinsale Vintage & Classic Motor Club.

The crossing Holyhead to Dublin was rough, with gale force winds blowing. Calm was restored once on dry land after a pint or two of Guinness!

The following day participants made their way to Kinsale, a tiny fishing port, to start the rally which was waved off by the Mayor of Kinsale.

This year the 3rd Peaks & Dales Charity Run took place on Father's Day with 82 entries. Everyone assembled at the start for the customary bacon butties. There were three checkpoints enroute, this mid-one a stop at the Coach House in Lea for refreshments. Harry Lowe stood on the NEW bandstand to present the prizes and the car he would have liked to have driven home was Graham Rigby's Rover P5B. He also gave a trophy to Scott Jones with his Francis Barnett motorcycle.

An invitation was received by the club to be guests of Swansea Car Club, who were playing hosts to the Kinsale Classic Car club. Several members took part in two runs and visited the classics collection owned by Leyton Roberts. The place was stuffed full of Rolls Royce's and Bentley's and other exotic machinery. He was the man that invented the switch that your kettle has, it switches off when it boils. The proceeds made him a millionaire and allowed him to build up his collection.

The 6th Club Show at Etherow Park was a lively event with a jazz band 'Harmony Hounds' playing on Dave Bowden's lorry. With a barbeque and side stalls the show had a real carnival atmosphere. Those who attended chose Tony Jackson's 153 Jowett Jupiter as their favourite. He had rescued the car from a chicken shed in 1982. He had removed all the accumulated sh... and carried out all the work himself, including a full body restoration.

A special club night was held with Wilbert McKee talking about his life in the motor racing game. He was also a restoration expert. He shared his experiences first with Norton (he designed and built the space frame for the very first Manx Norton) before moving on to cars and working for Ferrari, Aston Martin, E.R.A. Lotus etc. He knew anyone who was anyone from pushing Damon Hill around Silverstone paddock in his pram to Michael Schumacker and his great friend Eddie Jordan who sent him a ticket for the British Grand Prix.

Clive Williams returned with two films featuring the design and development of the motor car over the last 70 years.

H & H CVC versus - The Show Organisers

A club's call for a boycott of shows charging for display vehicles has been described as totally unreasonable by a leading organiser. The Hare & Hounds Classic Vehicle Club is calling for support from the club movement to aid its campaign against charges. But show organiser Andrew Greenwood insists the action is being taken without due consideration and could lead to cancellation of events. Classic car weekly came to see club and take photos and had further discussion.

A general letter to clubs, written by Hare & Hounds chairman Phil Maddocks states 'When enthusiasts like ourselves devote a lot of time, effort and money into keeping these vehicles on the road, and are prepared at our own expense to bring these vehicles to a venue and lend them to organisers free for a weekend so they can charge the public an entrance fee to see the results of our efforts, we find it incomprehensible that they wish to charge us for giving them the privilege. The newly formed group representing autojumblers has called upon show organisers to divide up the costs of staging an event by charging car clubs to display their vehicles. Mr True of the National Jumblers Federation said 'why should the auto jumblers and the punters at the gate have to carry the car clubs, some of which are very well off? ...'

A club trip to Blackpool lights on a luxury coach was organised in October and many members enjoyed the delights of the Fylde Coast.



A TINY car spares shop in Marple owned by John Harrod has been threatened with legal action by world-famous department store Harrods.

Lawyers for Harrods chairman Mohamed Al Fayed have written to Marple-based Harrods Car Parts and Accessories owner John Harrod demanding that he changes his logo saying it is too similar to the store's.

Mr Harrod; who employs five staff, had his shop refurbished four years ago and employed a sign writer to design the logo, which he claims bears no resemblance to the Harrods sign.

Mr Harrod said: "All I have containing the name are some compliment slips, some business cards and a swinging sign. It's a pathetic situation". His lawyers are fighting the London store.

The letter from the department store's lawyers, D Young and Co, of Southampton, also states that Mr Harrod should cancel any advertising and phone entries. It said: "Clearly your use of your surname alone in the genitive case and depicted in our clients' trading style

is not in accordance with honest practices."

Harrods sued by Harrods in May magazine with permission from Metro News. Publicity from the radio and TV reports was very good for John.

The 12th Peaks & Dales Charity Run had an excellent half page spread in the Stockport Express following the run.




At the Christmas Party a cheque was presented to Norwood Trust for £1500.


To mark the club's 30th anniversary Rob Salter organised a short run after the show which took members past the club's namesake 'The Hare & Hounds' pub in Mill Brow.
